

Australians' Support for Restricting Tobacco Licence Eligibility

This cross-sectional survey examined Australian adults' perceptions of tobacco availability and illicit tobacco sales and their level of support for a range of government policies aimed at addressing illicit tobacco and reducing smoking in Australia. The nationally representative sample included 5,036 Australian adults surveyed in December 2025.[†]

KEY FINDINGS:

Among Australian adults, there was consensus that the illicit tobacco problem is pervasive and strong support for options to restrict tobacco licence eligibility.



[†]Participants were recruited from the Social Research Centre's probability-based panel Life in Australia[™]. Data were weighted to minimise selection bias and meet population benchmarks.
